Apollo 11 & The Tahquitzs Lodge

The man in this photograph is Dr. Charles Alden Berry, MD. He is a doctor of aerospace medicine, still practicing at age 90. Mr. Krikorian, Cahuilla Lod ge Historian Coordinator, traveled to Houston, Texas, in December 2013, to visit with Dr. Berry because he was the first Chief of Tahquitz Lodge 127 when it chartered in the year 1938. In the photograph he is pointing at the EKG (heart rate) print outs of Neil Armstrong, Michael Coll ins, and Buzz Aldrin of Apollo 11. Doc took these EKGs; more than that, he invented remote transmission of EKG! The four moments Doc cut out are 1. Launch 2. Lunar Descent 3. EVA, meaning Extra Vehicular Activity--the first moon walk 4. Ascent of the LEM back to dock with the Command Module for return to Earth. Armstrong's heart rate

Earth. Armstrong's heart rate went WAY UP as he took over manual control of the LEM, Lunar Excursion Module, during powered descent--mid-160s while standing still and flying the LEM at 3,000 mph.



Dr. Berry sent me home with greetings to his old Lodge, and a message for all the youth, especially the leadership, in Lodge 127: You can do anything, become anything, if you honestly assess your abilities, work hard, and do NOT give up. Hayden Martois and I will include more from my interview with Dr. Berry in the coming Lodge History Book.


